




Happy 150th Birthday, KPL!

We all know that the first five years are the most critical to a child's development and success. Reading is the gateway to learning, and that is why early childhood literacy is critical during this time. Since 1872, KPL has been a leader in the community for early childhood literacy and we are pleased to announce the launch of our revised 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program! The concept is simple; the rewards are priceless. Read a book (any book) to your child, age 0−5. The goal is to have read 1,000 books before your child starts kindergarten. Kalamazoo Public Library will be hosting Kalamazoo County ID to assist patrons ages 11 or older in obtaining photo identification to enable them to connect with public safety, civic, and community services.

Without a form of identification, a person is not recognized as a member of the community and not afforded the same opportunities as other community members. Having a form of credible identification enables people to become fully participating members of the community.

Eligibility criteria can be found at The Kalamazoo County website. The cost of a County ID is \$10, with scholarship funds available.




For the second year in a row, Kalamazoo Public Library teamed up with Project Linus to hold a spring blanket drive called *Fleece, Love, and Kindness*.




Read and Run with Ready to Read Saturday, August 13 9 am-12 pm | OSH/Outside







As you can tell from perusing this issue of *Prism*, the library is the place to be this summer season with plenty of reasons to visit in person or online. Your library is a great way to introduce early literacy skills and a love for reading by enrolling young ones in the *Summer Reading Challenge*. Signup for the 2022 Challenge: *Oceans of Possibilities* begins June 1 for everyone ages birth through grade 12. Prizes are earned for every 20 days of reading completed, with a grand prize awarded after 60 days of summertime reading!

You may start seeing promotions throughout Michigan that call attention to the incredible value that libraries bring to communities. *MI Library is NOW* is an effort funded in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services through the Library of Michigan that highlights how libraries have adapted services during the pandemic to ensure books, databases, technology, online programs, and unique library offerings are accessible. Kalamazoo Public Library found new ways to get resources to residents safely and quickly with curbside service, KPL Live and recorded programming, and Wi-Fi hotspots to learners. Engagement and outreach efforts involved many staff doing traditional library activities in virtual ways: from an online *Global Reading Challenge* and *Party in the Park*, to free book distributions and visits by the Mobile Library team to schools, parks, and events. KPL added new online resources and e-content, and even established a team of reference librarians available for online assistance by way of clicking a button.

In early May, MIRightToRead.com was launched to bring focus to the right to read for all Michiganders. It is an initiative of the Michigan Library Association (MLA), coordinated through the leadership of the Intellectual Freedom Task Force. Its goal is to protect Michiganders' right to read, oppose attempts to ban books from Michigan libraries, educate the public about the right to read, oppose any current or future legislation that infringes upon Michigan citizens' First Amendment rights and intellectual freedom, and ensure that librarians across Michigan will be entrusted to continue to do their jobs and serve the needs of all individuals and communities.
